The rubber tree (*Hevea brasiliensis*) is the source of most of the natural rubber used in the modern world. Native to the Amazon basin, it was long harvested by indigenous peoples long before the arrival of Europeans. When its industrial potential became apparent in the 19th century, the rubber tree became the subject of global economic competition. Seeds were transported to Asia, where climatic conditions favored the creation of vast plantations. This botanical exchange profoundly transformed the economic history of entire regions.
